Lesson Plan: Animals of the Chihuahuan Desert 4th-6th



Lesson Summary

The Chihuahuan Desert is considered to be one of the most diverse deserts in the Western Hemisphere and many different animals not only survive but thrive in this environment. In this lesson, students will learn about some of the animals and their characteristics.

Learning Objectives

Students will learn:

- How the environment in the Chihuahuan Desert plays a role in the survival of the animals.
- To recognize the unique characteristics of some of the animals of the Chihuahuan Desert.
- Interesting facts about the animals.

Background Information/Historical Context (For staff/teachers)

At about 250,000 square miles, the Chihuahuan Desert covers a large portion of North America from northern Mexico through the southwestern United States. It is home to around 1,000 different species of animals. Each of these animals have specific characteristics that help them survive in the desert. - Why does the environment of the Chihuahuan Desert make it difficult for animals to survive?
- What are some of the characteristics of desert animals?
- Which animals do you think are the scariest?
- Would any of the animals make good pets? Why or why not?

Activities

Activity: How High Can You Jump?

In this activity your students will compare their vertical jump to the jump of some of the animals discussed in this lesson plan, including the mountain lion and roadrunner.

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Activity: Create Your Own Animal Fact Sheet

The Chihuahuan Desert is home to more than 170 species of animals. In this activity, your students will select another animal found in the Chihuahuan Desert and create their own Animal Fact Sheet following the same template found in Resource File 1 including the animal's physical characteristics, diet, habitat, senses, predators, and additional interesting facts. Students can work either individually or in pairs to do research on an animal of their choice (that is not one of the eight provided in this lesson plan).

In this activity students are presented with a simple scenario to get them thinking about the predatorprey relationship between animals that live in the Chihuahuan Desert, particularly in this case, the relationship between a coyote and a desert cottontail.
